Word from Board Chair

Fall has arrived, and with it a new fiscal year and new plans at the Mississippi State Board of Physical Therapy (MSBPT). Your Board members and staff are working hard to ensure that Mississippi consumers of physical therapy are served by safe, competent, and ethical physical therapy professionals. Here are a few news items you should know about:

- We have a new Board chair. Dr. Cyndi Scott was elected the Board chair at the July Board meeting. Dr. Scott is a long time Board member, having served two terms on the Physical Therapy Advisory Committee to the Mississippi Department of Health and is now two years into a new term on the MSBPT. She currently practices as program director of William Carey University Physical Therapist Educational Program. Thanks go to Shannon Singletary, our outgoing Board chair, who has served the Board well during his tenure as president.
- Melanie Woodrick joined the MSBPT Board in July. Melanie was appointed by our governor as our consumer member. She is a C.P.A. and partner at Grantham Poole Accounting firm and has a rich history of board service.
- Doug Roll, PT, now represents the Southern Congressional District as a Board member. Doug practices as an orthopedic private practitioner on the Gulf Coast.
- Special thanks to Laurel physical therapist Phil Raspberry, who served in the southern district position for the past two terms, and to Kathy Henry of Brandon who served as the consumer representative for the past four years.

Two Board members and one staff member represented MSBPT at the FSBPT annual meeting in San Francisco in September. The theme of the conference this year was "Lifting the Fog of Regulation." Shannon Singletary, Cyndi Scott, and Beth Holmes participated in workshops on several new initiatives. Hot topics included board effectiveness, foreign-trained therapist licensure issues, license portability from state to state, regulating telehealth, the APTA Integrity in Practice Initiative, and new ideas in continuing competence. Watch for deliberations by the Board on some of these issues in the upcoming year. Also, congratulations to the MSBPT staff for being awarded a 5 star rating for reporting to the FSBPT practitioner database! Way to go, ladies!

The Board conscientiously seeks to serve the physical therapists and physical therapist assistants in Mississippi to provide competent, safe, and effective practice to the citizens of Mississippi. Please let us know how we can serve you better.

Mississippi Represented at the Federation of State Boards Meeting

On September 20, 2014 most of the 50 states and several U. S. territories were represented at the annual Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) meeting in San Francisco. So what goes on at a meeting in San Francisco? Shopping, eating great seafood, and riding trolley cars all day long are just some of the many activities that took place.

Now that I have your attention, I will tell you what really took place. The physical therapists and physical therapist assistants of the State of Mississippi were represented well. First, we had the opportunity to learn best practices to help our Board protect the public. Second, we looked at ideas to help our professionals that must work in multiple states. Finally, we discussed telemedicine and its role in the new frontier of treating patients from a distance. Our meetings and learning opportunities actually began at 7:30 a.m. and ended at 5:00 p.m. each day. In order to see the sights and eat the great seafood, participants had to settle for doing that at dark.

Your Board's primary responsibility is to protect the public. In doing so the Board may impose sanctions on those that violate the rules and regulations of our licensure act. Our sanctions should be progressive and consistent. In a workshop dealing with regulation, we were advised that looking back over the past five to seven years at decisions is a good way to maintain that consistency that is needed. This meeting reminded us to look at sanctions imposed by other states for similar violations. We were also taught to look at the legal community and to appeals history as a guide. Finally, in order to protect the public we must have a great relationship with our Board's attorney. In Mississippi the attorney general's office assigns an attorney to represent and guide the Board in all legal matters. Our (Your) Board attorney also helps us with interpretation of regulations and application of sanctions. A workshop dedicated to the role of the board attorney was a great reminder of all of their different functions. Here are just a few: The board attorney guides procedures so that they are followed appropriately. The attorney educates board members on procedures during hearings. The board attorney helps by articulating the basis or justification for a decision. The attorney advocates for the agency by supporting it in its decisions.

At this national meeting we also discussed ways to help physical therapists and physical therapist assistants more easily work in multiple states by means of a physical therapy licensure compact. Simply put, compacts are contracts between states. One easy way of thinking of this "agreement" would be thinking of the compact between states regarding drivers' licenses. Obviously, if you are licensed to drive in Mississippi, you are licensed to drive in all 50 states of the United States of America. Before I go further, I should say that this workshop was only a discussion and your Board has not entered into a compact with any other states regarding physical therapy licensure. There is a strong argument that if there were a physical therapy licensure compact between states, there would be an increase in access to physical therapy care and therefore benefit the public. If states did enter into a compact, each state would retain power over licensure. This compact ideology would also allow information regarding past violations and sanctions against therapists to be shared easily between states, thereby strengthening the state board's ability to protect the public. For the individual therapist that must work in multiple states, the process of getting licensed in multiple states would be streamlined and potentially be less expensive through use of a physical therapy licensure compact.

Finally, Alan Chong W. Lee presented a great workshop on telehealth. What is telehealth and how should it be used in physical therapy? Telehealth is a moving target definition; however, it can be defined as providing services with the use of telecommunication devices. With today's technology, it is reasonable that physical therapy patients may benefit through this service. Portable devices and other software can be used by therapists at a separate location to monitor wounds, give advice, and even measure range of motion. Some of the goals of telehealth would be to fill gaps in patient care and remove barriers that are out of the patient's control. Other benefits would include reducing facility costs, increasing provider efficiency, extending access to care to remote patients, and reducing travel costs. We also know that telehealth would not benefit those that need manual therapy, many services of wound care, or hands on examination. So, obviously telehealth should not threaten the traditional environments of physical therapy practice. It is also important to remember that licensure would be required not where the therapist is working from but instead where the patient is receiving the care. From this workshop, it is clear that telehealth definitely has a future in the practice of physical therapy; however, more research needs to be conducted and procedures need to be established in order to set best practices.

Attendance at these workshops is another way that your Mississippi State Board of Physical Therapy is at work making sure that it does its best to protect the public.

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DOES CONTINUING EDUCATION CREATE COMPETENCE?

Would your patients say that you are competent? How can they tell? How can YOU tell? The Mississippi State Board of Physical Therapy has a serious responsibility to assure consumers that physical therapy practitioners licensed in our state practice in a safe, competent, and professional manner. That is a huge commitment, and we take it seriously.

Many health care think tanks and the literature are convincing in their assertion that passive continuing education courses do not necessarily create competent practitioners. For example, the Pew Commission (1995) states:

The skills, competencies and values for a successful lifetime of professional practice cannot be learned in a single educational encounter. Rather, the health professions must recapture the tradition of a continuing commitment to learning. The rate of change in the health care system makes this commitment imperative for the practitioner and society alike. This commitment must transcend passive, continuing professional education and move towards clear standards of continuing competence.

So what is the difference between continuing education and continuing competence? Continuing education is usually considered to be attending an educational offering that is time limited and deals with a particular topic of interest in a seminar or conference format. Continuing competence is a much broader term that includes a range of activities, including self-assessment, professional service, research, educational offerings, and teaching. The APTA (2001) defined it this way: "The ongoing acquisition, application, and evaluation of contemporary knowledge, skills, and abilities to meet or exceed performance standards based on the physical therapist's roles and responsibilities, within the context of public health, welfare, and safety."

Your Mississippi Board is currently in the process of updating the continuing competence regulations for licensees in the state. Before you panic, we are NOT considering periodic re-examination for licensure renewal. We ARE working with our national leaders at the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy to develop a model of continuing competency that is right for our state.

We are contemplating a two-tiered system. The typical continuing education courses or conferences will continue to be a part of the model as "certified activities." We are also considering a wide range of other activities that may earn Continuing Competence Units (CCUs) as "approved activities." On the table for consideration in this category are credit for clinical instructorship, in-service activities, teaching activities, service on professional boards and committees, use of self-assessment tools, independent study, and numerous others. In addition, the Board is considering adopting some version of the national model, which requires 30 CCUs for each licensure period in order to renew. This is an increase in the number of required hours for our licensees. However, we believe that the addition of "approved activities" may offset the cost and inconvenience of the new requirements.

Expect new regulations for public comment in Spring 2015. In preparation for this endeavor, the Board will host Heidi Herbst Paakkonen at its January board meeting. Heidi is the continuing competence product manager at FSBPT, and she will be educating the Board on FSBPT's continuing competence model http://www.fsbpt.org/FreeResources/ContinuingCompetence/ContinuingCompetence/ContinuingCompetenceModel.aspx in preparation for revising the standards. Our meetings are always open to licensees and the public. We invite you to come and be part of the discussion!

REMINDERS

- □ All licensees must take two hours of board-approved programs in ethics/professional responsibility as part of their total CE requirement each licensure period.
- □ Address changes must be submitted on the change of address form located on the Board's website no later than thirty (30) days after such change is effective. The Board may assess a licensee a fee of \$25.00 for failure to notify the Board of address change.
- □ You should always verify that a course is approved on the Board's website if you plan to submit it for continuing education credit.
- □ Failing to report to the Board any unprofessional, incompetent or illegal acts that appear to be in violation of this law (Part 3103 Rule 6.1.29) or any rules established by the Board is a violation for which a licensed physical therapist or physical therapist assistant may be disciplined.
- □ Requests to change names must be accompanied by a certified legal document which attests the change (marriage license, etc.)
- □ The Board and its staff cannot answer questions about Medicare/Medicaid reimbursement requirements or codes. You will need to contact the Medicare/Medicaid office.

Did you know?

- There are 1,849 physical therapists and 1,065 physical therapist assistants with active Mississippi licenses as of November 7, 2014.
- The next scheduled Board meeting is January 15, 2015. This meeting is open to the public.
- All Board members are appointed by the Governor.
- ✤ 110 licensees did not renew their licenses for the licensure period ending June 30, 2014.
- Teal is the national color chosen to represent the practice of physical therapy.
- A current, passport-style photo is now required at your renewal time every four years. You should not upload a new photo any time except when required.
- The office does not have petty cash onsite.
- No licensee is required to submit paper documentation of continuing education courses when renewing. You only submit certificates verifying courses if you are notified that you have been randomly selected for audit or are currently on CE probationary status.
- The Board office will be closed on Wednesday, December 24, 2014 and Thursday, December 25, 2014 for Christmas which is a legal state holiday.
- The Board office will be closed on Thursday, January 1, 2015 and Friday, January 2, 2015 for New Year's which is a legal state holiday.
- You can update your change of address/employment by logging into your profile. The address must be a complete address with telephone number.

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING LICENSEES' EMPLOYMENT INFORMATION

Part of the application process for a physical therapist or a physical therapist assistant in Mississippi is to provide the name of your employer and the physical address where you will be practicing. However, if you are uncertain of your employment at the time you make application, it is important that you remember to notify the Mississippi State Board of Physical Therapy of your employment information (name of company, physical address, and phone number) as soon as possible after you become employed.

Notification of change of employment is also important. If you make a transition from one employer in Mississippi to another within the state, or even to an employer out-of-state, it is requested that you keep us informed of the physical location where you are practicing for as long as you are licensed in Mississippi.

Notification of new employment or a change in employment may be made in one of the following ways:

1. Go to www.msbpt.ms.gov and select the **Forms** tab on the menu on the home page. Download the **Change of Name and Address** f orm, print it out, and complete the information in the employment section. Fax the form to (601) 352-2920.

Often a change of employment also means a change in residential (mailing) address. If that is the case, please update your mailing address at the same time, including email address and phone numbers.

2. Due to the online application and renewal process, many licensees are already familiar with how to access their profile online. You may go into your profile and add or make changes in your employment information and also change your mailing address if needed. The data system time stamps such changes so that we have a record of when you made the change.

If you have not accessed your profile previously, please call the office at (601) 352-2918 for instructions and a temporary password.
